Delaware City Tree Commission



Trees and potential damage that can be prevented.

During the winter months (which typically extend through February or March), is a good time to prune trees for size, density, and crossing or rubbing branches. If trees are not leafing out you are safe to prune. Otherwise wait until tree has leafed out unless there is danger of damage to something else.

The following diagram is from an excellent online page regarding trimming and pruning.

To read the entire article see <u>https://deepgreenpermaculture.com/2019/07/07/tree-pruning-how-to-remove-tree-branches-correctly/</u> When removing branches, DO NOT make the pruning cut flush with the trunk or parent branch as this will damage the branch collar.

At the base of every branch is a distinct bulge where it connects to the trunk of the tree or an older branch, known as the branch collar. Do not cut or damage the collar area with your tools.

We are still getting questions from concerned Del City residents about root damage concerns. Damage is a result of roots exerting pressure on a structure: if the force is greater than the resisting force, damage will occur. We often see this in towns where tree roots have lifted paviors or cracked Tarmac. We are working to prevent this by planting the correct type of tree for the planned location (smaller at max height, normal shape and size of the root structure), and through using planting techniques designed to allow trees to blend with and thrive in an urban environment. The Delaware City Approved Tree Species List was approved by the Delaware State Forestry Division and these were some of their criteria for trees selected for planting by the City. We are also working on recommendations to our City Leadership regarding root damage to our sidewalks from City trees.

Although it is possible for tree roots to affect freestanding walls, they are far less likely to cause direct damage to house foundations as the resisting force is so much greater than anything the root can exert. When roots meet a solid object they tend to grow laterally, rather than downwards. Roots will also seek out and follow moisture from any source, such as rainwater runoff from gutters that is allowed to pool near the house foundation.

Some larger trees growing near a concrete slab patio/sidewalk can have roots that grow under the concrete that may cause the horizontal pad to be lifted and cracked. What happens MORE OFTEN is that as the root draws water, the soil slumps, and the pad cracks due to not enough pressure from underneath. If you keep the tree watered, this can help slow/eliminate this from happening.

For mature trees near homes, best advice is to keep them watered in summer and keep the shrubs and perennials near your foundation watered. This will keep your soil suitably compacted around the foundation.

With certain household income limitations, you may be eligible for a reduction on your city property tax rates during fiscal year 2025. (Beginning July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025)

1. Copy of Federal Tax Form (1040) for 2023.

If you do not file a Federal Tax Form, you must submit: a copy of 2023 Social Security Benefit Statements, a copy of 2023

interest statements,

and a copy of 2023 pension statements if applicable.

2. Proof of income for all household residents over 18 years old 3. Certificate of Insurance Award if disabled

4. Proof of age and address (Matching items 1-3 above) shall be presented. These include

Picture ID, License, or Birth Certificate for homeowner applying for discount.

Applications for Exemptions are available at Town Hall. If you need assistance filling out the application, please feel free to stop by Town Hall, and we will be glad to assist you. Office hours are Monday through Thursday from 9:00AM to 4:00PM and Fridays 9:00AM-1:00PM

PLEASE NOTE: This application form and the required documents must be submitted EVERY YEAR to demonstrate continued eligibility.

The President must first declare the flood a federal disaster; any assistance you receive is usually a loan that has to be repaid with interest. That is why you need flood insurance. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) was created by Congress in response to the rising cost of disaster relief for flood victims, and for more than 40 years it has provided protection for millions of families. About 100 private insurance companies nationally offer flood insurance backed by the federal government. Policies are available to homeowners, condo owners, apartment owners, renters and business owners. Typically, there is a 30-day waiting period from the date of purchase before your policy goes into effect. Contact your insurance agent or insurance company for more information.


