

MOST HOMEOWNERS INSURANCE DOES NOT COVER FLOOD DAMAGE

Floods are the #1 natural disaster in the US. Floods usually strike without warning. They occur in all 50 states. Millions of buildings have been damaged over the last several years. People have lost their homes and belongings, and they never saw it coming. Are you insured against such a hazard?

Your homeowners insurance covers many hazards. Flooding typically is not one of them. Many people believe federal disaster assistance will cover them. Not Always! The President must first declare the flood a federal disaster; any assistance you receive is usually a loan that has to be repaid with interest. That is why you need flood insurance. The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) was created by Congress in response to the rising cost of disaster relief for flood victims, and for more than 40 years it has provided protection for millions of families. About 100 private insurance companies nationally offer flood insurance backed by the federal government. Policies are available to homeowners, condo owners, apartment owners, renters and business owners. Typically, there is a 30-day waiting period from the date of purchase before your policy goes into effect. Contact your insurance agent or insurance company for more information. STORMWATER

As storm water runoff flows over land surfaces—pavements, yards, driveways, and roofs—it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water. In efforts to control storm water pollution, we must consider individual, household, and public behaviors and activities that can stop pollution from these surfaces. Here are some common individual behaviors you can do to help prevent storm water pollution:

- * Always pick up your doggie's doo! Doggie doo can wash into our streams and rivers and introduce disease-causing bacteria.
- * Pick up litter from your yard and storm drains.
- * Use natural products whenever possible! Toxic substances like insect sprays and moth balls should be used as little as possible
- * Plant more trees and flowers! It will make your yard more beautiful, and make it more difficult for chemicals to reach waterways.
- * Recycle as much as possible!
- * Check your vehicle for oil leaks and drips on a regular basis. When you find a leak, fix it promptly.
- * Collect oil in containers with a tight fitting lid. Old milk jugs are perfect!
- * Never dump motor oil, antifreeze or other engine fluids down the storm drain or into the ground.
- * Wash your car at a car wash that filters water, this will prevent oil from your car from entering the ground water
- * Use ground cloths under your vehicle whenever doing engine repair. Clean up all spills that happen in a timely matter.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in the water.

Stormwater pollution is one of Delaware's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of Stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of Delaware's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to Stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident or business, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

LIMIT YOUR USE OF FERTILIZERS & PESTICIDES

Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.

- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides. Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property in a natural state with trees and other native vegeta-
- tion that requires little or no fertilizer. If you use fertilizers and pesticides, fol-
- low the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.

PROPERLY USE & DISPOSE OF HAZARDOUS PRODUCTS

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn & garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous produces down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated
- Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portion of Hazardous Products in your home or workplace. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Visit DSWA.com for locations to dispose of hazardous waste.

KEEP POLLUTION OUT OF STORM DRAINS

Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark storm drains inlets with messages to remind people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies. Do not let sewage or other waste flow

CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR PET

- Pet owners or their keepers must pick-up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up waste.
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

DON'T LITTER

Place litter in trash receptacles. Recycle, Recycle, Recycle.

Participate in Community cleanups.

DISPOSE OF YARD WASTE PROPERLY

Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains. Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.

Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn. When residents see evidence that

someone has dumped chemicals or debris into the storm sewer system, here's what they can do:


